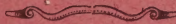

Superintendent's Report.

To the citizens and taxpayers of Huntington, Vt:—

Herewith is submitted my first annual report, also the first report of a Superintendent since the formation of the present union district. My term of service began July 1, 1909, and this report is based on a knowledge of your schools and the conditions governing their administration gained since that date. Many excellent features were found to characterize the work in most of the schools, and the results of such work form a good foundation for future progress. The problems incident to securing good schools in Huntington are, for the most part, those of the average Vermont town. Their solution, however, from the viewpoint of the school officials is not always possible. The voters determine, in a large measure, at their annual meeting, the conditions of organization and equipment. The kind and degree of interest which the citizens show is an important factor in their quality.

Improvements that seem desirable are always present but are not always capable of realization, because of local conditions. What seems desirable to those in intimate touch with the schools does not always seem practicable to those whose interest is only casual. A closer, vital interest of all the citizens in the conduct of the schools and the methods employed would result, I believe, in a great improvement. In the matter of teachers some few changes were necessary at the beginning of the fall term. Miss Blakely was secured for the East Street schools. At the same

time Miss Lena Flynn took the position in the North School left vacant by the resignation of Miss Ring. She was succeeded at the beginning of the winter term by Miss Gertrude Flynn. The other schools retained the same teachers.

To obtain and retain good teachers is one of the hardest problems school officials have to solve, and yet on its solution rests, to a large extent, the character of the schools. At present Huntington is, perhaps, as liberal as the average Vermont town in appropriation for teachers salaries, but in comparison to the general rise they will not be, in the future, sufficiently remunerative, to make teachers positions here especially attractive. If the town wishes to increase the efficiency of the schools by the retention of good teachers, it can do so by making an appropriation for salaries which will enable the payment of a larger maximum to the good teacher. The consolidation of schools so as to enable closer grading would, also, make teachers positions more attractive. This would necessitate, however, a considerable expenditure at the outset for the erection of a new building sufficiently large to accommodate pupils. The congested condition in the two village schools render it imperative that something be done to remedy this evil, if the best results are to be obtained. As at present organized the schools are too large for one teacher to handle and get the results that the patrons have a right to expect. If some way could be devised whereby the schools could be divided, and the pupils from East Street and the Pierce district accommodated the results, I believe, would be far more satisfactory than at present.

EQUIPMENT.

In estimating the work done by any particular school many things have to be taken into consideration and among these the school building and its equipment deserve notice. The buildings as a whole are in fairly good condition and with a few minor repairs could be made as satisfactory as can be expected under present conditions. Of course, from a modern viewpoint, they are not hygienic in respect to lighting, heating and ventilation, as is also the case with the great majority of Vermont school buildings, and could not be made so without a complete overhauling.

In regard to blackboards; with the possible exception of Hanksville, the space in all the schools is entirely inadequate. The Pierce district has sixteen square feet which is not enough for any school. The other schools are supplied in like proportion. At little cost they could be supplied with good, servicable boards. There is, also, a need of maps in the different schools. All, I believe, are supplied with good maps of Vermont, which is a great help. If maps of the continents could be provided from time to time it would be a decided help in the teaching of all the subjects.

There is a decided need, also, in the matter of text books. Many of the books now in use are now in poor condition and will need replacing with new ones soon. If, when this is done, some different texts could be adopted more suitable for use in all the schools, and purchases made in accordance with this adoption better results could be obtained, and I believe, it would be cheaper in the end. For a comparatively small outlay the books needed could be procured. This will be a necessity soon. It is not to be expected that all the needs of the schools can be filled at once, but if something can be done each year, it will not be long before there will be a decided improvement in their equipment.

COURSES OF STUDY.

New courses of study have been placed in some of the schools, though it will be some time before they are in smoothly working order. It is planned to so grade the schools that there may be steady progress from year to year and that pupils so desiring may enter high school with as equally good preparation as those entering from a regular graded school. As at present organized there is a certain waste of time and effort, especially when a change in teachers occurs, owing to the new teacher not knowing just what the pupils have done and what they are capable of doing. This condition, can be avoided when the courses of study are placed in operation in all the schools are adjusted to local conditions.

ATTENDANCE.

The attendance for the fall and winter terms has been fairly good, though there is much yet to be hoped for. The attendance, however, at Hanksville deserves particular notice. For the fall term the attendance there was 98.3 per cent. Out of a total enrollment of about twenty during the winter term sixteen were present every day, and four were absent only one day. Under favorable conditions this record ought to generally obtain. The attendance for the entire town for the fall and winter terms was 90.5 per cent. If parents would bear in mind that, directly or indirectly, they are helping bear the expenses of the public schools, and that to get full returns for the money expended the children must be in attendance every day, they would see to it that this desired result is accomplished. The irregular attendance of the child not only blocks his own progress, but it also impairs the efficiency of the entire school. It is to be hoped that parents and teachers will co-operate to secure good attendance. The best possible product of the schools is secured only when parents and teachers, home and school are working together for purposes mutually understood and appreciated.

Permit me to express to the teachers of Huntington my sincere appreciation of the cordial reception they have accorded me and their earnest efforts to do good work in the schools.
