## REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT.

*To the School Board of Huntington:*

Herewith is submitted my second annual report, it being also your sixth since the formation of the Union. There has been maintained during the last year four schools of 32 weeks each. This year has been one of steady progress. In some of the schools there has been shown a marked progress along the line of reading which will be alluded to later. At first there was a readjustment that had to be worked out, which I feel has been accomplished to a certain degree, in respect to the consolidation of the school at the North Village. This consolidation has shown a very appreciable advance for the pupils in all respects but in one way; and that is the taking of the youngest pupils in teams, but now that the entrance age is 6 years and suitable conveyances are to be provided, I can not help but feel that there will be a more satisfactory feeling along this line. I would like to ask parents to be patient in this respect and try and make as earnest endeavors for their own children as they expect others to make, so that they can attain an education.

We have been able to hold the same teachers throughout the year and they have been as follows:

It will be seen from the above that there have been 5 different teachers employed. This one change was on account of Mrs. Pierce receiving the appointment as Post Mistress. Mrs. Pierce has worked faithfully in our schools doing at all times what she deemed best; and I am sure there are quite a number who regret that she left the school work. I am sure all of the teachers have shown a great interest in their work and deserve praise from all of us. I know that there are some that will disagree with me, but if they took the pains to enquire into the matter with unprejudiced eyes on both sides of the question they would feel different.

## BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT.

In the matter of buildings, I believe the town will compare with any town of its size. Huntington certainly did take up the

burden that was placed upon them in a manner which deserves much credit to them. The Catherine Ross School is one that you certainly have reason to be proud of; and when the grading is done and grassed over any one coming in town can not help but be impressed with the building. There are some repairs that should be made upon the school house at the Center, which I believe the School Board are aware of and will see that they are done.

Equipment: Drinking tanks have been provided for two of the schools and the other has running water. There seemed to prevail a large amount of carelessness by the pupils in their work, and it has been a great problem to remedy it. I have taken up two means to correct this which have met with a certain degree of success. One was the checking up of all numerical work by the casting out of nines and the other is the use of Minimum Essential Sheets in language and also in Arithmetic. These sheets comprised a study sheet and also a sheet to test pupils at times that I visited the schools. The Civil Governments were also brought up to date. The Ward system of Reading has been adopted in all the schools and it certainly has improved the reading to a great extent. This system fits the pupils so that they can work out words that are new to them as well as being a great aid in spelling.

#### ATTENDANCE.

The records for the different schools in respect to enrollment, average attendance per day, per cent., tardiness and visits by parents are as follows:

The above shows a total enrollment of 138; average daily attendance of 25.8, 171 cases of tardiness; the per cent. of attendance for the whole year of all the schools was 94.1. In every case there is a great gain over last year. There are 8 cases where pupils have not an absent mark for the year to their name: 1 at the Center, Estella Russell; 7 at Hanksville, Jessie Norton, Iris

Higley, Wilson Sweet, Nathan Sweet, Earle, Henry and Fletcher Zeno. These pupils certainly have set a pace for the rest to follow.

#### ORGANIZATION.

We maintain the nine grades in school and the pupils are classified as follows:

We held an exhibit of the school work for the year but there were few visitors. I can not help but feel that the parents did not understand what it was for and I am sure that next year there will be a larger representation. I believe that the exhibit is beneficial in a great many ways as it gives the parents a chance to see what work their children have gone over, the teachers can also see what other teachers are doing and it forms an incentive to the pupils to do better work so that their work will be shown.

#### GENERAL.

Our course of study has remained the same but we are to receive a new one from the state this year. The manner of presenting writing material is to be changed next year and I hope that there will be better work done along this line.

The average cost of teachers per week was \$10.75. The average cost per pupil for supplies for the last year was 97.6 cents.

I wish to say that I am proud of the schools and school houses of the town of Huntington and that I feel sure that they will compare in every respect with any rural community in the state. My work this year has been a very interesting one and I have taken great pleasure in all my dealings with the School Board and the people of Huntington.

In conclusion permit me to extend to you, the directors and the teachers my most hearty appreciation for the spirit of co-operation and sincere interest in all school matters which have at

all times been manifested and have contributed so largely to the success of our schools.
