To the Voters of the Town of Huntington:

Herewith is submitted my fourth report as Superintendent of Schools.

The statistics on transportation are as follows:

It was decided to repair the Center School during the past summer and the project was carried through to standardization. The cost was somewhat more than expected but the work is well done and the cost was less than the average for standardizing a school. The school is now in fine condition and an asset to the community. The Town should be proud of this school which was given honorable mention by the State Department of Education as being one of the best in the county. State Aid of \$300. has been received by the Town Treasurer to help defray the expenses of repairing this building.

The needs of our schools are as follows:

The Catherine E. Ross School needs painting, and surely the Hanksville School needs extensive repairs.

I would recommend that the Town take advantage of the State Aid now available and improve the Hanksville School in so far as it can afford it.

It will be noticed that one large item of school expense is for high school tuition. There were 20 pupils from Huntington taking high school training. This is a larger per cent. of high school pupils than that of many larger towns that actually have a high school of their own. It is a good record for Huntington.

In closing, I wish to do honor to the memory of Mr. Wells, who was interested and enthusiastic in the welfare of the schools while he was one of the directors, and whose untimely death is regretted.
