REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Voters of the Town of Huntington:

In compliance with the laws of Vermont, I herewith submit my tenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Four elementary schools have been maintained for a period of thirty-five weeks during the year. Schools with enrollments are as follows:

In most of the schools the attendance has been well above ninety per cent for the year. Much credit is due parents for the interest they show in the welfare of their children by causing them to attend

regularly, as this is the only way by which steady progress in school may be maintained. To allow pupils to be absent without a sufficient reason is depriving them of the training to which they are entitled.

No money was spent for transportation during the school year which ended June 30, 1945. Some expense for this item will appear at the end of the current year as it is necessary to transport a few pupils who live some distance from the schools.

Fortunately one new teacher only was necessary at the beginning of the present school year to fill a vacancy in the primary room of the Catherine Ross School. With the extremely critical shortage of teaching personnel in the state, Huntington has been fortunate to have secured the services of fully certified teachers. Few towns have been able to secure enough teachers to maintain a full staff without the necessity of employing some War Emergency certified people.

In general, the courses of study have been continued as in the past. Several new texts have been purchased to improve the teaching in some subjects. Considerable emphasis is being placed on the necessity of teaching science and health in all the schools and new texts in these subjects have been introduced. More will be added as funds permit. A health clinic was held at the Center School at which time several pupils received immunization treatment for some of the more common children's diseases. It is desirable that more of such clinics be held in the future in order that the health of children may be improved. Audiometer hearing tests have been given to all children from grades three through eight with very satisfactory results. An additional check will be made later in the year.

With a shortage of labor and material during the war, repairs to school buildings have been kept at a minimum. Now that this emergency has passed, some improvements should be made, as new requirements in the rating of schools will doubtless be made by the State Board of Education. It is advisable to anticipate these needs and be prepared.

I would recommend that the interior of the Hanksville School and the exterior of the Center School be repainted. New curtains for the Hanksville School are necessary, but as yet it has been impossible to purchase them. Since much trouble with water in the basement of the Catherine Ross School has been experienced, I would recommend that something be done to overcome this difficulty. It is not only an inconvenience but a menace to the health of the children in this school.

In conclusion, I wish to express once more my appreciation of the support which the voters and townspeople have given the schools during the year.

The Number of Recipients in December, 1945, was 29.

The resources of this department and its ability to make payments are determined by the state appropriation which is matched by federal funds. During recent months it has not been possible to grant assistance or to increase all who were found eligible after investigation. The cost of living has increased so much that about every case needs to be increased that is not now getting the maximum. The cooperation of Overseers in extending temporary aid and supplementary medical services has been very helpful.

The administrative expenses of this department have risen slightly during the biennial period but the administrative review of the Social Security Board emphasizes that the total administrative cost per case per month is among the lowest in the country.

The advice and counsel of local officials and interested people are gratefully acknowledged by this department and its field staff.

Article 12. "Shall license be granted for the sale of liquor?"

Article 13. To determine what action the town will take in regard to purchasing road and winter maintenance equipment.

Article 14. Shall the town employ an auditor as provided by No. 55, Acts of 1937?

Article 15. To transact, vote and act upon any other business which may legally come before said meeting.
