REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Voters of the Town of Huntington:

In compliance with the laws of Vermont, I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The usual number of schools have been maintained during the year for a period of 35 weeks, the minimum required by law. Schools with enrollments are as follows:

Huntington Center, grades 1-8	18
Hanksville, grades 1-8	15

Good attendance has been maintained in all the schools throughout the year. It has been reduced slightly during the recent weeks in the Catherine Ross school due to absence caused from several cases of chickenpox. Since the amount of State aid returned to the town is determined by average daily attendance, it is hoped that there will not be a serious epidemic of this disease.

During the school year which ended June 30, 1946, a total of \$763.40 was spent for transporting 15 elementary pupils or an average of \$50.89 per pupil. It is through the cooperation of the parents only that this item can be kept at a minimum. In many of the towns in the State it is much larger.

One of the greatest difficulties which have been encountered during the past few years is that of securing teachers. For two years it has been impossible to persuade young teachers to accept teaching assignments in one room schools or even in villages which are not located on main transportation routes leading to larger centers. This is the situation with which your school board was confronted at the close of the year 1945-1946 when it was necessary to secure two teachers for the Catherine Ross school. Had it not been for the willingness on the part of two former teachers to return to service, it would have been necessary to have closed some of the schools. Low salaries together with the fact that enrollments in the training institutions are small have resulted in a most critical shortage of teaching personnel not only in our State but also throughout the nation. At the present time, the outlook for an increased supply for next year is not at all encouraging.

On account of the difficulty in securing new textbooks due to the paper shortage, no new courses of study have been introduced. A new course in health education has been anticipated for some time,

but due to lack of revenue with which to purchase the material necessary to conduct such a course, it has seemed advisable to postpone the introduction of this course for another year. The basic subjects recommended by the State Department of Education have continued. The training which these courses give will prepare students for high school.

In conclusion, I would recommend once more that the artificial lighting in the Catherine Ross school be made more efficient. This can be accomplished by increasing the number of lights in each of the two rooms from two to four at a very small expense. Since there is little doubt that a minimum of \$1,500 for teachers' salaries will be adopted, I would recommend that sufficient appropriation be made to permit your school board to offer salaries comparable with those paid in other parts of the State. In this way only can we hope to secure the services of well qualified teachers to fill vacancies in the schools.

I desire to express again my personal thanks to the members of the school board and townspeople for the support given the schools during the year.

For the information of your taxpayers the customary annual statement is presented for your Town Report.

Payments of Old Age Assistance to persons applying from your town amounted to \$8,715.00 during the year January 1, 1946 to December 31, 1946.

Payments for funeral expenses \$100.00.

The number of recipients in December, 1946, was 29. Monthly payment, \$859.00.

The maximum payment which can be made by this department is \$40.00 per month. In October, 1946, we were able to make payments above \$30.00 for the first time. This was due to an appropriation of \$50,000 by the special session of the legislature and a temporary change in the basis of federal matching. Congress authorized the Social Security Administration until December 31, 1947, to reimburse the States \$10.00 for the first \$15.00 paid. For the balance of the payment the old fifty-fifty matching basis is still in effect.

Many increases were made to meet cost of living budgets. Grants are practically up to date on current investigated applications. Intake has increased and is now on a prewar basis of about 100 applications per month.

- Article 7. To determine what per cent will be raised on the Grand List for the following:
 - The General Fund.
 - Winter Maintenance on State Aid roads.
 - Winter Maintenance on Town roads.
 - Dust control.
- Article 8. To determine what per cent on the Grand List will be raised for expenses of schools.
- Article 9. To determine what per cent on the Grand List will be raised for Town roads.
- Article 10. To determine what action will be taken in regard to financing the purchase of road and winter maintenance equipment.
- Article 11. To determine what amount the town will appropriate for maintenance of State Aid roads.
- Article 12. To elect the following town officers:
 - School Director for three years.
 - Road Commissioner for one or more years.
 - Selectman for three years.
 - Two Listers (one for three years and one for two years.)
 - Auditor for three years.
 - Town Agent for one year.
 - Town Grand Juror for one year.
 - Overseer of Poor for one year.
 - Constable for one year.
 - Two Cemetery Commissioners.
- Article 13. "Shall license be granted for the sale of malt and fermented beverages?"
- Article 13. "Shall license be granted for the sale of liquor"?
- Article 15. Shall the town employ a district nurse?
- Article 16. To transact, vote and act upon any business which may legally come before said meeting.
