

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Voters of the Town of Huntington:

In compliance with the laws of Vermont, I herewith submit my

annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The usual number of elementary schools has been maintained for a period of thirty-five weeks which is the minimum required by law.

Schools with enrollments are as follows:

Attendance has been quite regular in most schools. It is very important that the daily average be kept as high as possible because the amount of State Aid which the town receives is based upon average daily attendance. Too many unnecessary absences result in a loss of school revenue from the State.

The cost of transporting pupils still continues to be one of the major items in the expense of operating schools. During the year which ended June 30, 1948, a total of \$1,642.30 was spent for transporting thirty-eight elementary pupils or a yearly average of

\$43.22 per pupil.

At the beginning of the present school year, one new teacher was necessary to fill a vacancy in the Center school. Mrs. Doris Cousino of Bristol accepted this assignment. With such a critical shortage of elementary teachers as exists at the present time, the town is very fortunate to have a staff of well qualified teachers. Within the next few years, it will doubtless be even more difficult to secure teachers, especially for one-room schools.

One of the more important changes which have been made in the courses of study is in the subject matter in History and Geography in grades four and five. In previous years, the History recommended for the fourth grade has been very difficult for pupils in this grade. By interchanging the work of these two grades, much more satisfactory results are being attained. The same is

true in the subject of Geography.

In general, school buildings are in fairly good condition although some of them need redecorating. On account of the extremely high cost of labor and material, repairs and major improvements have been kept at a minimum. Such repairs as were absolutely necessary have been made. In these days of exceedingly high prices, one hesitates at making recommendations which involve the expenditure of large sums of money. There are, however, one or two improvements which I wish to suggest. I would recommend that the exteriors of the Hanksville and Center schools be painted during the coming summer vacation. I believe that much more satisfactory instruction could be given if the number of grades in each of the one-room schools were reduced to six. This could be done by interchanging the pupils in some of the grades of these two schools. By reducing the number of grades in each school much more time could be devoted to the individual grades and thereby increase the efficiency of instruction. I believe this would not necessitate too great an expense.

With the constantly increasing enrollments in all the schools, the time is not far off when the town will be faced with a serious housing problem for its school children. It is well to anticipate this situation and be prepared to meet it before it is too late.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the voters of Huntington for the fine support which has been given the schools in the past, and I solicit your continued interest in the future. I desire also to express my personal appreciation of the cooperation which the members of the school board and townspeople have given me during the past years in my efforts to serve as superintendent of schools.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

For the year ending December 31 I am submitting my annual report to the Selectmen for the Town of Huntington in regard to

the sanitary conditions and the public health in general.

There has been some improvement in reporting contagious diseases to the Board of Health, but during the year the record on this is not as good as it should be. A quarantine on a house is not put there to work a hardship on a family, but it is to prevent a mild case from spreading and perhaps cause the death of some other innocent child.

Section 5301 of the Public Laws of the State of Vermont reads as follows: "A physician who suspects that a person whom he has been called to attend is sick or has died of a communicable disease dangerous to the public health shall immediately quarantine and report to the health officer the place where such case exists, and the name, degree of virulence and cause or source of the disease, and such other facts relating thereto as may be necessary for the health officer to make examination and act in the premises."

At some time during the year a large percent of schools have cases of lice, impetigo and scabies. Not all of the re-infections in these cases come from the schoolhouse. If the child or some other member of the family have had the same trouble within the last few months, consider your house contaminated and insist on carrying out the following rules: Consult your family physician and keep child out of school until cured. Avoid direct contact with others as far as possible. Finger nails short and plenty of soap and water more than once daily. It is essential that all linen, bed clothes, towels, stockings and underclothes be thoroughly washed and boiled daily. Woollen clothing should be dry cleaned. If these precautions are not followed re-infection is likely to occur. In case of lice allow no child to attend school with lice or nits even though they appear to be dead (as the dead may come to life).

In general the health of the town has been very good.

The number of communicable diseases that were reported is as follows, (from which there were no deaths): Scarlet Fever, 1; Chicken Pox, 6; Measles, 13; Whooping Cough, 1.

The expense involved for taking care of the Health Department

was \$78.01.
