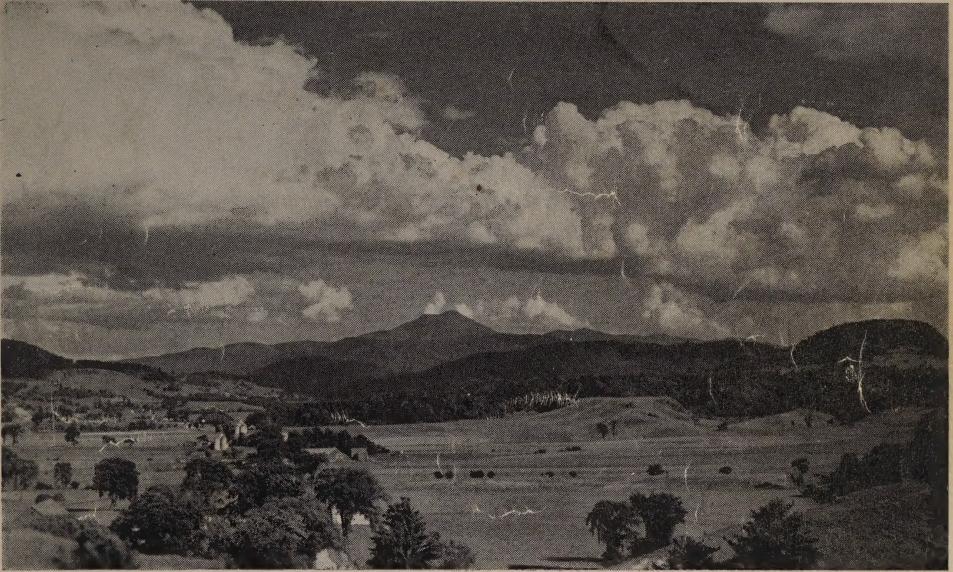

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

### *To the Voters of Huntington School District:*

In compliance with the Laws of Vermont, I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

As in previous years, one two-room and two one-room elementary schools have been maintained for thirty-five weeks each.

Schools with enrollments for the year 1951-1952 are:

Attendance in all the schools has been good. In most cases, it has averaged above ninety percent. To insure steady progress of pupils and to secure the town's proper share of state aid for schools, average daily attendance should be kept as high as possible. According to an amendment to the State Aid Law passed by the last legislature, absences due to quarantine may be counted in determining the A. D. A. for the year provided a statement from the local health officer showing the number of days pupils were in quarantine accompanies the copy of the annual Statistical Report sent in to the State Department of Education at the end of the school year. For this reason, parents should report all cases of communicable diseases to the health officer. Failure to do this means a loss of state aid to the town.

Transportation of pupils still continues as one of the more expensive items in the operation of schools. During the school year which ended June 30, 1951, a total of \$1,676.60 was spent for transporting forty-one pupils or an average cost of \$40.89 per pupil.

At the beginning of the current school year, no new members of the teaching staff were necessary since all the former teachers returned to their respective positions.

In order to reduce the teaching load in the Center and C. E. Ross schools, sixth grade pupils from the Center school are being transported to the C. E. Ross school and those in grade five in the C. E. Ross school are being carried to the Center school. This arrangement reduces the number of grades in these schools and permits much better instruction.

Courses of study have been improved by the introduction of several new texts in many subjects. Writing is being given more attention in all the grades. Basal reading is being made more uniform in the lower and intermediate grades.

Much emphasis is being placed on reading as this is without doubt the most important subject in any school system. A new type of report card is being tried out this year.

Improvement in school buildings has been kept at a minimum due to a limited school budget. A new fence has been erected at one side of the C. E. Ross school and several pieces of playground equipment have been added to the inadequate supply at the C. E. Ross and Center schools.

Recommendations which I would like to make must be limited since the amount of money available for school purposes is small.

Some repairs are necessary to the interior of the C. E. Ross school and new lights should be provided for the Center school as those now in use are entirely inadequate. I would recommend that the repairs be made as soon as possible.

If the enrollments continue to increase, I believe the time is not far off when it will be necessary to build a new school large enough to accommodate all pupils in town or to enlarge the C. E. Ross school and employ more teachers if your schools are to improve in the future.

Since this is my final report, I wish to express to all those who have served on the school board and to the townspeople my most sincere appreciation of the support which has been given the schools during the seventeen years in which I have served as Superintendent of Schools. I shall always remember with pleasure the excellent cooperation which I have received from the people of Huntington.

## HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

For the year ending December 31, 1951, I am submitting my annual report to the Selectmen of the Town of Huntington in regard to the sanitary conditions and public health in general.

*Health Conditions:*

The health in this town has been very good during the year, with the exception of colds and mild cases of grippe with which all towns seem to be unable to get along without.

*School Clinic:*

In November a school clinic for all children in the first and third grades was held in the schools. A good number were vaccinated against smallpox and given the first immunization for protection against diphtheria and tetanus.

*Communicable Diseases:*

Many cases of communicable diseases were not reported to the health officer so no accurate tabulation can be made of the exact number that were present during the year. As I have urged before more cooperation between parents about reporting these diseases is desired.

*Communicable Diseases to be Reported:*

Cholera, diphtheria, epidemic spinal meningitis, acute anterior poliomyelitis, scarlet fever, smallpox, typhus fever, measles, whooping cough, mumps, German measles.

*Communicable Diseases That Were Reported:*

Chicken pox, 4; measles, 20. From which there were no deaths.

*Expense:*

The expense involved for the Health Department was \$47.10.

VERMONT DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL WELFARE  
MONTPELIER, VT.

This is our Sixteenth Annual Report to the citizens of the Town of Huntington, on state payments in your municipality of various types of assistance and welfare during 1951.

The total number of recipients in the State has declined, but expenditures are larger by reason of increases in the legal monthly maximums authorized by the 1951 Legislature. Funds for the support of these programs were derived from the Federal Government 57.5%, State Government 37.6% and Town or City 4.9%. Total administrative expenses for the four types of Public Assistance were 4.2% and for all programs and services 6.5% giving Vermont top ranking in the nation for low cost. In Vermont one in six persons over sixty-five receive old age assistance and one in fifty children under the age of eighteen receive aid to Dependent Children.

None of the assistance programs are pensions. They are paid on the basis of need and in accordance with policies and procedures established under law. Children and parents, in proportion to their ability, have legal as well as moral obligations under the statutes.
