VERMONT DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL WELFARE

MONTPELIER, VERMONT

This is our twentieth annual report to the citizens of the Town of Huntington on State payments in your municipality of various types of assistance and welfare during 1955.

The total number of recipients in the State has remained reasonably stable for four years. The number aided in the Totally and Permanently Disabled program has continued to increase. Old Age Assistance and Blind Assistance caseloads have declined. The impact of the Social Security Insurance programs have not been fully realized in Vermont but will be a continuing factor in the reduction of caseloads as an increasing number of our people attain a fully insured status. At the present time less than 50% of the aged population in Vermont, sixty-five years or over, are entitled to Social Security benefits. The towns

and cities participated financially in two of the programs as indicated below. Administrative expenses for the four types of Public Assistance have always been among the lowest in the nation.

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REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Being mindful of my multi-faceted responsibility to the children, parents, school boards and teachers of my district, and being acutely aware of the increasing teacher shortage, I am taking this opportunity to present general facts district-wide for the consideration and action of all the people concerned.

We have been fortunate, as a district, to have the services of the teachers who staff our schools. In many instances these teachers are local people who feel a loyalty to the hometown schools and give wholeheartedly to the task of educating the children of their townsmen. They have made no attempt to look elsewhere for employment, and I know they have refused better positions and better paying positions. These same facts are no less true of our non-resident teachers. I believe we should seriously concern ourselves with some important, relative questions. How much longer can our teachers stay with us if the pay check is larger not too far from home? Will better teachers staff our schools if ours should leave us? Will replacements teach for less or the same money now being paid? Will we be able to compete for teachers with other districts around us in this ever-narrowing teacher supply? Some parts of our district have given raises in the past, it is true; others have not seen their way clear financially to do so. It is becoming more and more necessary today to condition our thinking to raising more money for maintaining good staffs and schools. It can be argued that there are many dimensions to the problem of pay scales, and many areas nationwide are making studies on the subject. We, however, will do well if we take the simplest steps in salary adjustments to at least improve the findings presented below. Each town, necessarily will have to work out its own measure of improvement.

The Vermont Conference on Education which met at Montpelier last September expressed itself in favor of salary adjustments comparable to those of persons in other professions. The recent Washington Conference on Education echoed the same sentiments. The teachers in this district, like teachers in districts all around them, have met and discussed this problem. In areas adjacent to ours, improved salary scales are going into effect, and these areas have consistently paid more than ours. Our teachers have submitted suggestions as a result of conferences with leaders well versed in the field of salaries. In turn, I have made a comparative survey of the problem which I present briefly below.

According to the January, 1955, report of the Vermont Education Association, the average salary in our district is tenth from the bottom on a statewide comparison. The state average for beginning grade teachers is \$2,769.75. Sixty percent of the teachers of Vermont are better paid than ours. Thirty out of fifty-six teachers in our district are getting less than the median salary in our own district. The low salary in our district is \$2,000. The high salary is \$4,600. The average salary is \$2,693. The median salary is \$2,600. These figures include administrators' salaries.

There is no implication whatever in this report that we have been paying minimum salaries below the figures which were legislated. The tendency has been in many areas, however, to use these minimums as maximums. Years of experience and quality have not been considered. This tendency will not encourage trained people to stay in or return to the teaching profession, nor does it provide the impetus for more young men and women to enter the teaching profession. Official reports inform us that Vermont needs 372 teachers annually and it is producing 175 in all levels of education in all of our colleges this year. Not all of these will teach. This means we have had to fall back upon the interested former teachers and other people trained in related areas. Even so, retirements are cutting into this supply steadily. We are fast approaching a situation similar to London, Ontario's. They advertised for a teacher this way, "Teacher wanted for School No. 22; state salary and qualifications if any."

A recent report made by the Ford Foundation for the Advancement of Education states, "If American democracy as we know it should collapse, one of the major causes would certainly be public indifference to the economic plight of the teaching profession." ". . . the best talent of the younger generation finds that education is not as highly valued as law, medicine, advertising, or many technical skills."

Our children are our most priceless possessions; the future of our country rests in their hands, and both of these invaluable depend upon our teachers. Can we afford to short change our children by short changing our teachers?

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING SERVICE

The advent of Salk Polio Vaccine in 1955 has occupied one of the top concerns of the Public Health Nursing Program in addition to other preventive services. The successful use of the Salk Vaccine again points up the fact that community cooperation is vital to any endeavor of this kind. As soon as the supply of Polio Vaccine is available, opportunity for protection will be offered the children from two months through five years.

We wish to express our appreciation to the volunteer workers for the fine contribution they have made toward the health program in the town.

Eighty visits were made to mothers and babies, especially with mothers having their first baby, or any particular problems.

One hundred thirty-four visits were made as follow-up on preschool and school conferences to discuss with families the need of corrective measures for some physical defects.

Thirty-five visits were made for the nursing control of communicable disease.

Ninety-four visits were made to children and adults for general family health supervision.

A Medical Conference for infants and preschool children was held in June with Dr. John Fuller examining 36 children and giving the necessary immunizations. The school children will be examined after the first of the year.

Twelve children were vaccinated against smallpox; 7 received Triple Antigen against diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough, and 17 received a Booster. Eighty-five children went to Richmond to receive their Salk Vaccine, and 7 received a Booster dose. Parents are to be commended for their response to the immunization program, and the follow-up with Booster doses.

It would seem beneficial to the children if some type of Hot Lunch Program could be planned for the schools. The people of the Hanksville District are to be commended for their effort toward this plan. The children could also benefit greatly if they made use of the Dental Program offered by the School of Dental Hygiene at the University of Vermont.

Chest X-ray Clinics held twice each month by appointment at the Bishop DeGoesbriand Hospital in Burlington and once a month at the

Fanny Allen Hospital in Winooski were available to persons referred by their physicians as being in need of a chest X-ray.

The public health nurse for Huntington is Mrs. Florence Shea who has her office in Essex Junction.
