## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The children of Huntington are no less precious to their parents, state and country than the children of any other group of parents. Our country believes in the dignity and rights of the individual; good schools and a good education have become a birthright in our country. One of the superintendent's duties is to try to raise the sights of a community in order that those precious young people will be better prepared to meet the ever-increasing demands and responsibilities of the atomic age. My plea for the children of Huntington is consolidation of the three separate schools into one four-room building so that each teacher may handle but two grades. The quality of education will improve because time for each child and subject will increase and the subject load for each teacher will decrease. I am aware of the financial problem involved, but if there is enough interest in a better quality of education, ways and means are soon found and developed by the people themselves. This has been true in many communities throughout the country.

A number of repairs have been made at the C. E. Ross School to improve the appearance, safety and sanitation of the building. Annual repairs must continue on all the buildings in order to prevent great expenses at any one time.

### VERMONT DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH REPORT

Through the following programs the State Department of Health works with the Health Officer and other officials, doctors and local citizens on community health. This report summarizes



many of the services rendered to Huntington last year and indicates other services available.

*Cancer and Chronic Disease:* Two persons received services which included diagnosis and treatment at tumor clinics or financial aid toward hospitalization costs.

*Child Health Services:* Forty-six children attended two well-child and school conferences organized by the public health nurse. Four children with orthopedic, cardiac, plastic or neurological conditions received services or appliances through clinics for handicapped children.

*Communicable Disease:* Two persons received x-rays; 36 children received immunizing series, including booster injections, against diphtheria, whooping cough, and/or tetanus. The immunizing series against poliomyelitis, including boosters, was given to 40 children and adults.

*Environmental Sanitation:* A sanitarian or sanitary engineer made seven inspections-consultations concerning water supply, sewage disposal, public buildings and other problems to protect health through improved town sanitation.

*Health Education:* All programs offer educational services. Pamphlets, films and speakers are available. A health reference library is maintained. The health educator consulted with many groups on health education programs, studying or organizing to take action on local health problems.

*Hospital Services:* There were two inspections-consultations to the hospitals, nursing homes or homes for the aged.

*Industrial Health:* Services for chest x-rays in industry and inspections and consultations at industrial sites were available.

*Laboratory Services:* As aids in the control of communicable disease, tests were performed on seven water samples, 35 blood specimens and six other specimens. Vaccines, antitoxins and biologicals were distributed for protection against communicable diseases.

*Public Health Nursing:* The public health nurse's headquarters is in Essex Junction. Assisted by local people, she served at well-child and school conferences, x-ray and immunization clinics. She visited homes, doctors and agencies, making 224 visits on behalf of 41 persons and community health activities. Her service is an essential element in the department's programs for health promotion, disease prevention, diagnosis, treatment and education.
