**REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS
AND SCHOOL BOARD
Huntington, Vermont**

The school opened this year with an enrollment of 99 students in grades 1-8. This is a substantial increase over last year's 84 students.

The teaching staff includes Mr. Phillip Brace, grades 4-8, Arts and Social Studies, Mrs. Freda Trapp, grades 4-8, Math and Science, Mrs. Martha Judd, hired to replace Mrs. Carlene Weaver, grades 2-3 and Mrs. Ruth Bennett, grade 1.

The Federal Program, with refinements, was continued this year starting in September, and the money made available by the Federal Government for Huntington was wisely spent by your School Board. It had to be used for new programs which in Huntington include music, foreign language, remedial reading, library, health services and special classes.

At the time of this writing Huntington has voted to seek admission to the Mt. Mansfield Union High School. The Union District will be voting on Huntington's request in the middle of February, 1967. The planning for next year's school at Huntington will depend a great deal on the result of this vote.

The installation of a bell system and hard surface outside has added to the total school program and usability of the plant. It will be necessary for us to continue to improve our present facilities and plan for the future of our school program. The library facility and program has been improved upon this year due in large part to the efforts of the Boosters Club, Mrs. Hotchkiss and Mrs. Carlene Weaver. It is an important improvement that Huntington has a right to be proud.

I wish to acknowledge the fine work of your school board, teachers, custodians, school lunch cooks and bus drivers. They have, as in the past, done a commendable job for your children.

HUNTINGTON LIBRARY REPORT

To the Citizens of Huntington, Vermont:

The Huntington Library is located in the Town Clerk's Office Building at the lower village common.

During the summer of 1965 a children's reading program in the Tracy residence proved successful enough to expand. Last summer the adult and junior State of Vermont Library books were moved from the lower village Post Office into the spacious, well lighted Town Clerk's office building. Volunteer teen age girls read to the young town children six mornings a week during the summer months. An excellent variety of books for all ages is brought here by the St. Albans Regional Library Bookmobile. Periodicals and records are also available for all residents of Huntington. The 30 classical records were given to the town of Huntington by the State of Vermont Free Public Library Service.

It is hoped that a "Friends of the Library" group can be formed. This group could raise funds to purchase a needed set of encyclopedias and subscriptions to a local daily and weekly newspaper as well as perhaps, a paper from New York City or Boston. Volunteer service is needed during the winter time. State aid is not available for the Town's library until more ambitious, adult interest is shown. The town selectmen have agreed to maintain and to allow the use of the clerk's building for a library. The local children have shown me that there is need for a public library here. Increased use of the library will prove beneficial to you and the library.

Grateful acknowledgment is made to the girls who helped carry out the Children's Reading Program last summer.

CHITTENDEN COUNTY REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION REPORT

To the Citizens of Huntington, Vermont:

At the 1966 March Town Meeting the voters of Huntington agreed to send a Representative to the Chittenden County Regional Planning Commission. As the Commissioner from Huntington I believe it is important to preserve and develop the fine qualities of Huntington. But Chittenden County is an area which is in an active state of change right now, and Huntington is caught up in this change. We may not have the water, sewage and zoning problems that face towns like South Burlington and Essex Junction; however, we have them to a lesser degree. The problems will intensify as the Burlington area continues to grow. Through effective regional planning, Huntington will be prepared for these problems when they arrive. The Greater Burlington Area has reached a saturation point and we are beginning to absorb the overflow.

Huntington and other Vermont towns can no longer be self-contained. Growth and change have created problems in guiding future development, traffic, water supply and water pollution, inadequate dumps, diminishing access to water and recreational areas, zoning conflicts and meeting educational needs. This is why there is a need for the Chittenden County towns to plan together. I hope that you have answered your public opinion survey questionnaire so that the commission will know how you wish to have Huntington develop.

During the past year the Chittenden County Regional Planning Commission has written its charter and by-laws and set up a two-year appropriations budget for the commission. Huntington Selectmen have agreed to send \$41.00 a year for two years as our contribution on a per capita basis. Federal funds will amount to \$84,000, the State share is \$21,000 and fourteen county towns and cities will share a total of \$26,200 toward the commission budget. The Commission is presently hiring a professional planner who will draw up a Master Plan for the county.

With the assistance of the Vermont Central Planning Office we have been able to work out a program of services for the county towns and cities and to apply for the federal funds. The program will include basic studies, a comprehensive plan, implementation, a final report and citizen education.

The Chittenden County Regional Planning Commission has discussed, formed sub-committees and attended meetings for regional projects such as Civil Defense, a Water and Sewer District, the Winooski River Basin Proposal, a regional incinerator and the Burlington Belt-line.

It is difficult for a single town to determine how it will grow and should develop. Through effective regional planning and the consolidation of area town services you will get more for your tax money with improved services.

Several county communities have also hired their own planners and have established their own planning commissions. Inasmuch as our local zoning commission has been inactive for two years, I recommend that we designate the Chittenden County Regional Planning Commission as the local planning commission in order to keep up with the times.

VERMONT DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL WELFARE

This thirty-first in the series of annual reports submitted to the people of Huntington presents tabulations for the calendar year 1966. In the Department of Social Welfare's program of assistance to the aged, blind or disabled 30% of the costs of hospital and physician services, as well as the excess over \$80.00 per month in Nursing Home Care, are assessed against the town of settlement of the recipients of such care. Participation charges incurred by your community during the past year for each of these types of care were as follows:

Nursing Home Care	\$ 1,263.39
Hospitalization Services	
Physician Services	\$ 90.45

Under similar settlement provisions town participation in the program of Aid to Families with Dependent Children is at the rate of one-eighth the assistance grants while costs incurred for the care of Committed Children are borne equally by the local and state agencies. Charges assessed against your community for the former amounted to \$176.25 and the for the latter \$364.13 for the year just closed.

During 1966 assistance was granted to 15 residents in your community under the Aid to the Aged, Blind or Disabled program. Direct money payments to these persons were financed entirely out of state-federal funds. Among the other programs financed from these same sources were Services for the Blind, Adoption Services, Medical Aid for the Aged, and Medical Assistance. While no town-by-town records are compiled for these categories, their benefits were available to all qualified residents.
