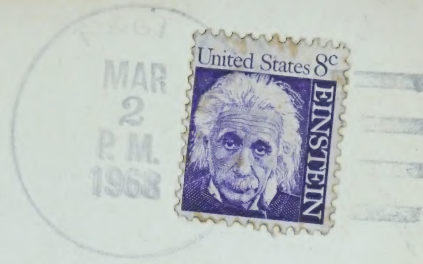

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD AND SUPERINTENDENT  
1967

The enrollment in grades one through six remained the same for this year as it was for last at 72. The first grade for next September however, promises to be large, around twenty, while we lose only six grade six students. This increase will put our estimated enrollment close to ninety. The fourth teacher will be needed for 1968-69.

The teaching staff includes Mrs. Phillip Brace, grades one and two, Mrs. Ruth Bennett, grades two, three, and four; Mrs. Freda Trapp, grades four, five and six. The staff is an experienced group of teachers who have spent hours of their time to provide your children with the best possible educational opportunity.

The Federal programs this year have been changed somewhat due to a reduction in funds and the movement of grades seven and eight to Mt. Mansfield Union High School. The remedial reading is being taught by Mrs. Helen Green who has replaced Mrs. Fay-Bond Hinricks. Mrs. Warren Austin is conducting the music program, grades 1-6, with fine results. The library and slow learners positions are open at the present time following the departure of Mrs. Hinricks. Mrs. Jane McNall is again the school nurse and providing our school with health service which is needed so badly by the school district. The Federal programs for this school district have added an elementary guidance position on a part time basis. Mrs. Gail Engel's major project thus far being the establishment of a special learning class for the district. It is expected that Federal funds will be available for next year which will enable us to continue these many worthwhile programs.

The school year in Huntington has seen a number of changes with the most noteworthy one being the opening of Mt. Mansfield Union High School. The beginning of this Jr.-Senior High seems to have been successful with few real problems. It is, of course, just a beginning and the true worth of the school and its education program is yet to come. The Union School, while new, is as predicted, near capacity at the present time. It seems likely that immediate plans and decisions must be made in regards to this situa-

tion. It would not be beyond the realm of possibility however, if we were to expand this Union plant to its core of eight hundred students now. That when it was completed we would again be facing a full school house. The questions are, of course, "What do we do now?" "What should we do then?" The problems are with us now and apparently will be in the future so your thoughts and ideas would be appreciated as we plan our school building program.

The education in Huntington, as well as the State, seems to be at the point where great changes are taking place. Items such as school reorganization, ungraded schools, expanding school population, rising school costs, Union schools, methods of instruction, teacher shortage, etc., are common discussion topics. We feel it is important that all of these ideas are studied and evaluated to see what is best for our school district. To change just for the sake of changing is not good but to remain as we are may find us falling behind.

We wish to acknowledge the fine work of your teachers, custodian, school lunch cooks and bus drivers. They have, as in the past, done an excellent job for your children.

MT. MANSFIELD UNION HIGH SCHOOL  
DISTRICT REPORT

The day of September 8, 1967 was a memorable moment in time to the students, citizens and teachers of this area. Mt. Mansfield Union High School was now a reality and a functioning educational institution. Problems in the electrical, plumbing and other areas had forced a delay but those seemed far away as we began our first semester. Enrollment totalled 617 that first day and as the students passed to their classes, there appeared to be an awareness that they were embarking upon a new educational experience.

The students, coming from ten different schools, were quick to make new friends, and those who had feared that the size of the school would prevent them from participating soon found themselves engulfed in the busy Mansfield educational life. As could be expected, there were many problems which required attention during the early weeks. However, the year has been a relatively smooth one and with the excellent staff and fine student body, a good beginning has been made.

The new school, coupled with new industry in Chittenden County, has fostered a population growth in our district. New students arrive daily, and we will be nearing school capacity by the end of this year. An increase in students will necessitate more teachers, more space, more textbooks and more of everything that is necessary for quality education.

We expect over 700 students in the fall of 1968. The Mt. Mansfield Board of School Directors has launched a study of our needs and how we may best utilize our core of facilities here. As educational costs continue to rise, we are again reminded that education is expensive. You will be hearing more about this study and expansion plan in the near future.

On the basis of present enrollment figures it is estimated that Huntington's share of the cost for debt retirement and operation of Mt. Mansfield Union High School from January through June of 1968 will be \$31,979. The share for July through December 1968 will not be finalized until the annual meeting of Union District No. 17 in May.

Volunteers are needed to help keep the library open to the public more often.

Thank you for making your library an important part of town. This year, 1968, we aim to have at least twice as many readers check out books.

CHITTENDEN COUNTY REGIONAL PLANNING  
COMMISSION REPORT

To the Citizens of Huntington:

Planning is necessary for self-protection. Now that Huntington is growing in population, the land use needs control and the value of the land needs to be protected.

At this writing there is strong support for a bill which would allow towns and counties to do what they want with their natural resources. Your Regional Planning Commission as well as your local Zoning Commission recommend Bill No. H-479 as the tool by which our town plan can be coordinated with regional towns into a comprehensive plan.

During the past year the Chittenden County Regional Planning Commission has continued to support efforts to preserve our natural resources. We have also begun studies for a better police force on a regional basis and have approved water and sewage grants for two towns.

The Chittenden County Regional Planning Commission's Executive Director, David Fonseca, Jr., joined us in June 1967. He is the only full-time paid planner on the job until the federal government comes through with approved funds.

The additional help will be hired to draw up a comprehensive plan for the county. This plan will be guide for towns planning water and sewage improvements, refuse removal, plocie and fire protection. The plan will enable towns to make better use of their tax revenue and land and will preserve the natural beauty of our town and county.

## REPORT OF THE HUNTINGTON ZONING COMMISSION

Your town Zoning Commission has met several times during the winter months. We fell strongly that there should be definite guidelines established to govern the growth and development that already has become apparent in Huntington.

We present the Hnutington Mobile Home Ordinance as a control measure of the most critical aspect of our growth problem at this time, due to rapid development of this type in our neighboring towns. We urge the adoption of this ordinance as one step in a program aimed at preserving the natural beauty abounding in our midst, protecting property values of our forests, farms and homes ,encouraging a healthful, convenient and orderly growth of our residential, recreational, commercial and industrial pote ntials. At the same time we are protecting our citizens from excessive and unwise tax burdens caused by increased public services brought about by this growth.

We urge the citizens of Huntington to become better acpuainted with the planning aspect of town development and to think of it as a tool to guide that development. If we would have our town grow and at the same time preserve the serenity and natural beauy of our landscape, to broaden our tax base and not overburden ourselves with higher taxes to pay for added services demanded by the very growth we are trying to foster, to protect our forests and farm lands, to encourage a rational, healthful and convenient development of our rural communities without losing the attractiveness of uro familiar rural Vermont scene, — then we must, by all means, think of town planning as our salvation. Let us adopt a town plan *before* that developmen engulfs our town without a plan to guide it.

**VERMONT DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL WELFARE**  
**Montpelier, Vermont**

This thirty-second in the series of annual reports submitted to the people of Huntington presents tabulations for the calendar year 1967. You may note a reduction in some or all categories of charges assessed your community. This is due primarily to passage of the Welfare Act by the 1967 session of the Legislature and in particular by its elimination of town sharing in programs administered by the Department of Social Welfare. Charges assessed your community were for goods and services received by the recipients prior to July 1, 1967. On those provided after this date there was no local participation.

In the Department of Social Welfare's program of assistance to the aged, blind or disabled 30% of the costs of hospital and physician services, as well as the excess over \$80.00 per month in Nursing Home Care, were assessed against the town of settlement of the recipients of such care. Participation charges incurred by your community during the past year for each of these types of care were as follows:

Nursing Home Care	\$ 1,249.45
Hospitalization Services	\$ 24.00
Physician Services	\$ 21.60

Under similar settlement provisions town participation in the program of Aid to Families with Dependent Children was at the rate of one-eighth the assistance grants while costs incurred for the care of Committed Children were borne equally by the local and state agencies. Charges assessed against your community for the former amounted to \$180.00 and for the latter \$228.07 for the year just closed.

During 1967 assistance was granted to 12 residents in your community under the Aid to the Aged, Blind or Disabled program. Direct money payments to these persons were financed entirely out of the state-federal funds. Among the other programs financed from these same sources were Services for the Blind, Adoption Services, and Medical Assistance. While no town-by-town records are compiled for these categories, their benefits were available to all qualified residents.
