REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Directors and Citizens of Moretown:

There has never been a time in the history of our school system when the schools have been so upset and disturbed by so many different things as during the past year. Your superintendent, teachers and the pupils have all been called upon to do their bit in aiding every war movement and we are justly proud of the response from the schools in this respect.

They have bought bonds, war savings stamps, assisted in the Red Cross and in the United war campaign they went "Over the top" under the name of the "Victory Boys" and the "Victory Girls" in fine shape.

Finally there came the epidemic of influenza taking out five weeks from the school work just after they were well started.

It would seem that all this would upset the work, and it did, but the teachers have the schools back on a good footing so that I am sure the work at the end of the year will be fully up with former years.

As the war has changed all social and economic life throughout the world, so will it effect the schools and their plans so that we must in time adjust ourselves to new conditions. We do not want our children taught after the German idea. We must guard against Bolshevikism by training in the public schools. We must teach patriotism, loyalty and the principals of a new democracy.

TEACHER PROBLEM.

Throughout the state there is a shortage of teachers and throughout the United States there is a shortage of fifty thousand teachers. The cause for this may be attributed to girls going into office work during the war. This is true but the serious part of it is they are not coming back, for the attractive pay and continuous service will hold them. To pave the way to what the people must expect I will say that it is only fair that the average pay of the teacher must be equal to a common office girl. We ask our teachers to interest themselves in community life and get acquainted with the people but I wish to call the attention of the people that there is some obligation on their part. I have had teachers leave the rural schools for no other reason than discontent, loneliness. Make the teacher welcome in your home, see that she has an opportunity to attend church and entertainments, and thus create a mutual and renewed interest in your social life and in the schools.

RESULTS OF SCHOOL WORK.

When I first came on the district one of the things that troubled me was the fact that such a large number of the boys and girls that went to preparatory school failed. I had severaltalks with the principals of schools and the list who were deficient was not pleasing. I have made it my business to try and raise this standard in the schools and to-day with nearly thirty pupils of my district attending preparatory schools all are up in their studies and doing good work.

BOOKS AND SUPPLIES.

You will discover an advance in the school expenses due to the natural rise in the price of everything, but the school board have not purchased anything this year that they might get along without, hoping of course that the price of books and supplies would be less after the war. The natural wear and tear on books will necessitate the purchase of some books next year and we are at this time in need of more new arithmetics and some reading material for all grades.

THE VILLAGE SCHOOL.

The village school has grown in the last two years until the number of pupils and the amount of work seems to call for assistance of some kind. In the primary department the teacher can not do justice to the pupils or to herself in trying to teach about forty pupils and four grades. I call the attention of the public to this matter for it is one of the questions that has been and will be up for discussion in the school board.

I must say in conclusion, as I have said in other reports, that my work is made a pleasure in your town through the association with a people interested in progress and a school board always ready to do the right thing for the town and the pupils.
