## REPORT OF DISTRICT HEALTH OFFICER.

In sending this, my first annual report, I wish to call attention to a few features of the new law.

Contagious Diseases. Physicians are required to report and quarantine all cases of contagious diseases which they attend. When no physician is in attendance, the head of the family, who knows that a contagious disease exists in his household, is required by law to at once report the facts to the District Health officer.

Under a regulation of the State Board of Health, school teachers are also required to report all cases of contagious diseases occurring among their pupils, or in families from which their pupils come.

Teachers are instructed that they must no allow children to attend school who are afflicted with lice, or contagious diseases of any description.

The public has a right to expect protection from contagious diseases, and the co-operation of all citizens is requested, that contagious diseases may be suppressed.

Medical Inspection of Schools. The importance of the supervision of the health and hygienic conditions which surround the thousands of school children of Vermont, can no longer be questioned. Every school, whether situated in a rural community or in a town, requires adequate Medical Inspection.

In communities where school inspection has been properly carried out a remarkable reduction in amount of contagious disease has been the result. This reduction of contagious disease was among the general population, as well as the children attending school.

If the town votes to have medical inspection of schools, which consists of an examination of every child in every school, the work is done by the state without expense to the town, excepting the printing of cards, for the recording of examinations.

An article as to this should be inserted in the warning for every annual town meeting. This is a highly important question and every town in the state should vote to have it.

### ORGANIZATION OF THE LOCAL BOARD HEALTH.

On Sept. 2nd, a meeting was held at the Town Clerk's office, with members of the Board of Selectmen and School Directors present. The Local Board of Health elected for its Chairman, W. H. Hathaway.

There were no unusual health conditions to report since July 1st, and the cases of contagious diseases which have occurred have been reported through the press.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the Honorable Board of School Directors and Citizens of Moretown:

While nothing unusual has occurred during the year, there has been a high standard of work maintained and much advancement made. It is always necessary to call the attention of the citizens to some facts relative to the value and importance of education.

Commerical, economic, patriotic and moral standards in the community and state depend, to a very large extent, upon the high purpose of those having in charge the education and development of this generation.

There is always danger in letting down standards of our ideals in civil life but it is very rare that we get them too high.

It is always the aim of your superintendent to place in the path of every boy and girl such influences as will lead to the highest ideals and every parent must remember that their support is necessary to make them effective.

### FINANCIAL MATTERS.

For some time past there has been an aggitation over the pay of teachers. At a meeting of the school directors of the state held in Burlington where every section of the state was represented, a resolution was passed recommending that they be given a raise of fifty per cent over what they were paid in the year 1916.

If the teachers are satisfied with that there need be no reason for alarm, for each of my towns have increased the pay each year so that in some cases it would only mean about twenty per cent added.

The conditions demand that the teachers pay compare somewhere near the pay of girls doing commercial work. Already I am beginning to hear from girls who have taught only one year that they intend next year to go into some office work.

Two years ago I gave some figures comparing te percentage of increase of the school department with that of the road commissioner, selectmen and found that during a period of five years all other departments had increased in expense more than the schools.

I still think this would work out the same in any period of years although the cost of the schools has increased more rapidly during the last two years.

#### TEACHERS.

There are forty teachers employed in my district and out of the forty it is natural to expect that there will be two, three or four not as strong as I would wish either in discipline or academic work, but as a whole I am sure they would compare with any district in the state. While many towns are obliged to employ teachers with no teaching training, on permits, I have only one in my entire district. On a visit of the State Supervisor I was complimented on the splendid selection of teachers.

I advise the early selection of teachers and have had the co-operation of the school boards of the different towns to back this method.

### MEDICAL INSPECTION.

There is a law now whereby each town may have medical inspection of school provided it is voted in town meeting.

I trust that the school directors will see to it that this matter is brought to the attention of the voters at the March meeting. There is a great need for this for there are many children with eye, ear, nose and throat troubles needing attention.

### ATTENDANCE.

With no epidemic prevailing the attendance has been much better than last year. There are cases that need attention in each town and the law was made for these cases and not for those who attend regularily.

The law requires teachers to report but many times there seems to be no one to report to and when they do report, it is not followed up. The state had a definite purpose in making these laws and it is this laxness that adds to the percentage of illiteracy of the state.

#### STATE AID TO TOWNS ON REPAIRS.

In the Legislature of 1919 there was a law passed making appropriation to assist the small towns in repairing district school houses and in many cases this year the state has come to the aid to the extent of paying fifty per cent of the expense.

My recommendation is that each town take one building a year placing all their money there against what the state will aid and thereby get one model school house each year.

As a whole there are no alarming conditions. Our schools are receiving splendid support considering the increased cost of main-

tainance. The realization of the worth of education has been conclusively shown since the war by the large number of students crowding the public and private institutions of learning.

At critical times in the policital and commercial world the need is stronger than ever for training our boys and girls in the highest things of life. Let us all continue to co-operate to this end.
