TOWN MEETING WARNING

The legal voters of the Town of Moretown and the Moretown School District are hereby warned and notified to meet at the Town Hall in Moretown on Tuesday, March 7, 1950, at 10 o'clock a.m. to transact the following business:

- ARTICLE 1. To elect a Moderator.
- ARTICLE 2. To elect a Town Clerk.
- ARTICLE 3. To act on the reports of the several Town and Town School District officers.
- ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint one or two Road Commissioners.
- ARTICLE 5. To elect all necessary Town and Town School District officers.
- ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to have the taxes on real and personal property paid in installments and to fix the dates of payment of taxes.
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to have the taxes paid to the Treasurer or to the Collector of Taxes.
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to provide any discounts regarding payment of said taxes and if so, how much.
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money to pay current expenses of the Town in anticipation of taxes for that purpose.
- ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town School District will vote to authorize the School Directors to borrow money to pay current expenses of the Town School District in anticipation of taxes for that purpose.
- ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote the sum of \$526.15 toward the support of the Public Health Nursing Service from July 1, 1950 to June 30, 1951, in order that the service already established may be continued and in such manner as to take full advantage of Federal Aid.
- ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote a speed limit through the village limits.
- ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to spend \$25.00 per mile on Town Highways which sum is to be matched by the State of Vermont in accordance with No. 101 of the Acts of 1937.
- ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to take advantage of the State Aid law for resurfacing selected highways.
- ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to erect a World War II Memorial and if so, what kind of Memorial.
- ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for a permanent World War II Memorial and if so, how much.

- ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire bonds for Town Officers from year to year.
- ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town School District will vote to authorize the School Board to pay the entire public High School tuition of Moretown pupils attending Public High Schools from September, 1950.
- ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote \$1,000.00 to take advantage of State Aid on Northfield Selected Highway.
- ARTICLE 20. To see how much the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to pay for a site for a town dump.
- ARTICLE 21. To see how much money the Town will vote to pay for land for a new cemetery.
- ARTICLE 22. To see how much the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to spend for improvements on Town Hall.
- ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote the Auditors authority to employ the services of an accountant from the office of the Auditor of Accounts, to conduct an audit of the accounts of the Town.
- ARTICLE 24. To see how much the Town will vote to pay the Town Listers per hour.
- ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to pay \$1.00 a month towards the electric lights in Town Clerk's Office.
- ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to charge 6% interest on delinquent taxes in addition to the 8% fee paid the Tax Collector.
- ARTICLE 27. To see how much percent the Town will vote to raise on the dollar of the grand list of the Town for the year 1950 to pay current expenses and indebtedness of the Town and to pay State and County taxes.
- ARTICLE 28. To see how much percent the Town School District will vote to raise on the dollar of the grand list of the Town School District for the year 1950 to pay current expenses of the Town School District.
- ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$300.00 toward the support of a physician.
- ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to observe Daylight Saving Time for the year 1950.
- ARTICLE 31. Shall licenses be granted in the Town for the sale of malt and vinous beverages?
- ARTICLE 32. Shall spirituous liquors be sold in this Town?
- ARTICLE 33. To transact any other legal business.

The town of Moretown is an area of 23,348 acres, with a population of 975, according to last census figures. It is situated on Mad River in the heart of the Green Mountains, at an altitude of 620 feet. Moretown is bounded on the north by Waterbury and Middlesex, east by Berlin, south by Northfield and Waitsfield, and west by Duxbury. The industries are largely farming, logging, lumber manufacturing and generation of electrical power. The village of Moretown lies in the extreme southwest corner of the town with approximately 200 inhabitants.

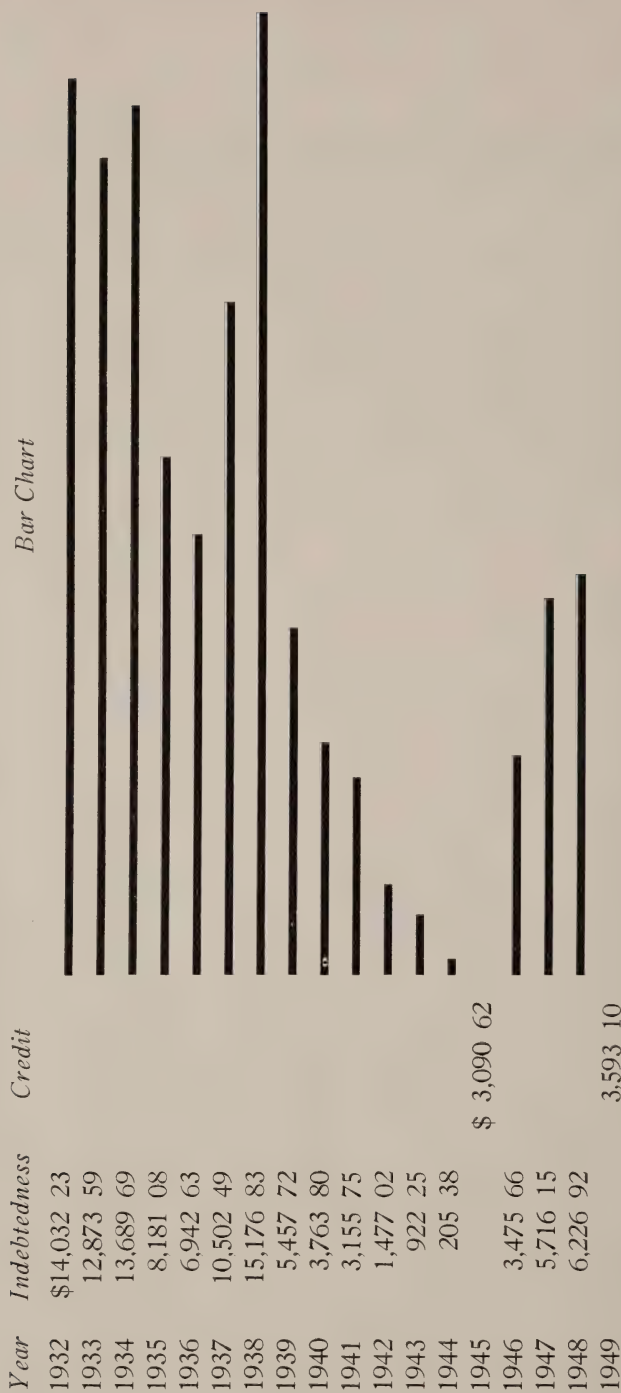

HIGHWAYS

There are 70.557 miles of public highways in the town of Moretown:

Total mileage in the State Road System.....	11.657
Total mileage of Town Selected Roads	10.28
Total mileage of Town Unselected Roads.....	48.62

The State Road System consists of all of Route 100 which passes through our town. The State of Vermont has complete control and responsibility for construction and maintenance of the State Road. The town was assessed \$1,738.52 this year for a part of that expense.

Selected Roads are as follows:

- Selected Highway No. 1—Northfield mountain road.
- Selected Highway No. 2—Duxbury road from Route 100 to Duxbury line.
- Selected Highway No. 3—Middlesex road from Middlesex bridge to Berlin line.

A State Aid Fund is available for resurfacing Selected Roads. The State will pay two-thirds of money expended up to a limit specified by the State Highway Board. Another State Aid Fund is available for construction on Selected Roads. Town money need not be spent unless orders drawn exceed the State money available.

Unselected Highways are all other roads within the town. Back Road State Aid money to the amount of \$5,863.22 was used on Unselected Highways this year.

There are approximately forty-five plank bridges with a four-to twenty-foot span, and six cement tubing culverts three to four feet in size, to be kept in repair by the Selectmen. There are also numerous smaller bridges and culverts maintained by the Town Highway Department.

Teachers

The supply of teachers for rural and graded school positions is still inadequate. It is particularly difficult to obtain teachers for rural school positions. Four of your teachers are residents of the town and have served more than the current year. The latest predictions on teacher supply indicate that, for several years we must expect this shortage to continue. The demand for teachers is likely to increase in the next few years due to the appearance in the classroom of the large numbers of children born during the war years.

Textbooks and Materials

A new reading system was introduced throughout the first grades of the town. It has been well received by both the pupils and teachers. It has proven to be an easier approach to reading than the system previously used. The system will be extended to the second grade in the fall of 1950. Your schools are well supplied with textbooks and general supplies. These items are vital and basic to an effective school program. The cost of these two items has been high, yet the needs of our young people had to be met to the very best of our ability.

An effort must be made to provide adequate maps for the various buildings. These will be purchased as rapidly as funds become available.

Health

It has indeed been most helpful to have Mrs. Lillian Parks Rowse, R.N., continue her work as Public Health Nurse. This is a most worthwhile program. The report of this year's activities will be found in the nurse's report.

It will be necessary for Moretown to plan for its share in financing the program. The Department of Public Health is requesting a total of \$526.15 to carry on this program.

Tuition

Moretown is financing the tuition costs of 53 high school students. These students are distributed as follows: Waterbury 21, Waitsfield 7, Montpelier 15, St. Michael's 7, Northfield 1, New Hampton 1, Mt. Hermon 1.

The Montpelier and Barre school departments have indicated that the tuitions in their high schools will be \$200 per year for each pupil.

We are also paying tuitions for 13 elementary pupils. Nine of these are located in the Cox Brook area. Eight of these pupils attend the Northfield Falls School and one pupil attends the Northfield village school.

Four eighth grade pupils from the Rock Bridge school area are attending the Waterbury Junior High School, with their tuition paid by the school board.

Transportation

This year transportation is being provided on a fifty-fifty basis for pupils of the Rock Bridge area. The parents pay one-half of the cost and the school board the other half.

In the Cox Brook area, we are transporting eight pupils to the Northfield Falls School. There was no other alternative as the Common School is overcrowded with pupils living in this area.

As an economy measure the Flannagan School has not been operated this year. The pupils are transported to the Village and the Taplin schools.

At the close of the school year June, 1950, the Flannagan pupils will have been serviced at the cost of \$1,050.03. This includes insurance on the vehicle carrying the children. The cost of operating the Flannagan School for 1948-49 was \$2,150.42.

At the time the decision was made to close the school there were only eleven pupils for the Flannagan School. By September there were fourteen, but these pupils could still be taken care of as planned early in March. A satisfactory vehicle was secured meeting the safety regulations required by the state.

Repair Work

The renovation of the Taplin School was the special project of the town during the past year, as was authorized by the vote of the town. Much of the work that was done does not show as an effort was made to have everything of durable value rather than surface appearance. The first consideration was to clear the title of the "site" itself. It was found that since the land of the Taplin School was deeded the main road had changed slightly, and since the site was designated in the deed of 1895 as being so many rods from the center of the road, the building was (the rear left corner) on the Ray White property. Paul Bigelow was hired to survey the site, and an additional strip of land was bought of Ray White and added to the right of the building for \$25.00. Stakes were set to designate the land, and this is properly recorded in the Town Clerk's office. A water right was secured from the Ray White property for the sum of \$10.00 per year and was so recorded.

All work done had to meet with the approval of the State Department of Education, in order to secure State Aid from the standardization fund, which is the \$200.00 item credited in the financial statement.

Mr. Kenneth Baird of Montpelier was given the contract and the school board feel the work was satisfactorily done. There is copper piping from "Ray White's" to the school, furnishing water for the flush toilets and the drinking fountain. The toilets and the ceiling of the classroom were insulated. A septic tank was installed, so any future "stream pollution" regulation has been anticipated.

Large windows extend along the back of the building, providing an adequate amount of natural light for the classroom. An oil heater has been installed. This heater is large enough to heat added space if it should ever be added.

The expense listed as "Taplin School" includes all money spent on the Taplin building, some of which would have been essential even though there had been no remodeling. The department of the state had already requested improvement of the sanitation of the school.

Other work completed as a part of the project includes the building of a new chimney, building of shelving and cupboards, redecorating of the interior, and sanding and refinishing of floor.

Anticipated repair work includes the painting of the exterior of the Taplin School and the interior of the Common School.

In conclusion, may we express our appreciation for your support and the cooperation in providing an educational opportunity for the boys and girls of this community. The schools are yours, they require your study and continued support. Your comments and suggestions are always welcomed.

YOUR PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

Moretown is one of the 38 Vermont towns provided with public health nursing service by the State Department of Health.

Moretown appropriated \$526.55 toward the cost of maintaining this service. Of total funds appropriated for Health Department public health nursing service, local towns contribute 20%, the State of Vermont 41%, Federal grants-in-aid 39%. Based on appropriated funds, the average annual cost of this nursing is about \$5,500.00 for each nurse.

The public health nursing service has as its primary purpose the promotion and maintenance of health and the prevention of illness in the community.

In accomplishing this purpose the Vermont Association for the Blind and P. T. A., town officials and townspeople as well as private and public agencies have been most helpful.

The following statistical report shows the services which I gave your town as your public health nurse during the period January 1, 1949, through December 31, 1949.

Type of Service:

To Mothers:

89 visits to expectant and new mothers.

To Ill Persons:

167 visits giving nursing care to sick persons at home.

To Children Under School Age:

231 visits to talk with parents about health needs of their small children.

114 children received a professional medical examination.

To School Children:

121 visits to schools.

123 children received professional examinations.

- 163 visits to homes of school children to follow up health recommendations of examining physician.
Decayed teeth and infected tonsils were the outstanding defects.
- 121 hearing tests were given by means of the puretone audiometer.
- 24 children needed further hearing tests.
- 5 children received examination at the diagnostic hearing clinics sponsored by the department of education. Where necessary parents received a report of the ear specialist's recommendations.

Prevention of Communicable Disease:

- 242 children of all ages were given toxoid against diphtheria and/or tetanus.
- 91 children of all ages were vaccinated against smallpox.

Corrective Work:

Follow-up of the medical recommendations and health inspections reveals 25 children had eye trouble corrected; 10 children had tonsils and adenoids removed and 34 children received some dental care.

In accordance with established custom, we are presenting a summary of State assistance payments during 1949 to individuals applying from Moretown.

These payments are financed entirely from State and Federal sources except Aid to Dependent Children in which the town or city participates to the extent of 12½ percent and committed children for whom the municipality reimburses the State for one-half the cost. The cost of all programs reflects to a large degree the economic consequences of the devaluation of the American dollar in terms of purchasing power and its effect on savings and investments.

Approximately 80 percent of all welfare and assistance in Vermont is now paid by the State. Vermont has proportionately fewer individuals receiving aid and smaller average payments than the

National average. Over 95 cents out of each public assistance dollar is paid to recipients and less than 5 cents is used for administration. No other State has a better record.
