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## WARNING FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING OF MORETOWN

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The legal voters of the Town of Moretown and the Town of Moretown as a Town School District are hereby warned and notified to meet at the Town Hall in Moretown Village on Tuesday, March 5, 1957 at 10 o'clock a. m. to transact the following business:

1. To elect a Moderator for the ensuing year.
2. To elect a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To act on the report of the Town and Town School District Officers.
4. To see if the Town will vote to have one or two Road Commissioners for the ensuing year.
5. To see if the Town will vote to have its Road Commissioner or Commissioners appointed by the Selectmen.
6. To elect all other Town and Town School District Officers required by law.
7. To see if the Town will have its taxes paid to the Town Treasurer or to the Collector of Taxes.
8. To see if the Town will vote to have its taxes on real and personal property paid in installments and whether payments shall be with or without discount and if with discount, to set amount thereof.
9. To provide for the dating of the tax warrant on real and personal property and to set a date when taxes on such property shall become due and payable or if the Town has voted to pay its taxes on real and personal property in installments to set dates when the same shall become due and payable.
10. To set a date on which the poll and old age assistance taxes of the Town shall be paid.
11. To see what action the Town will take with reference to the payment of interest on its taxes not paid when due.
12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to borrow money to pay debts and current expenses of the Town in anticipation of the collection of taxes for that purpose.
13. To see if the Town as a Town School District will vote to authorize its School Directors to borrow money to

- pay debts and current expenses of the Town School District in anticipation of the collection of taxes for that purpose.
14. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money for corrective work in the Town to be supervised by the Public Health Council, and if so how much.
  15. To see if the Town will vote the sum of \$25.00 per mile on Town Highways to take advantage of State Aid provided by No. 108 of the Acts of 1951 as amended by No. 264 of the Acts of 1953.
  16. To see what action the Town will take with reference to raising \$25.00 per mile to take advantage of State Aid for resurfacing selected gravel highways. (9.53 miles)
  17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate money, and if so, how much for the maintenance of the Moretown Memorial Library.
  18. To see if the Town will vote to exempt from taxation, and if so, for how long, new manufacturing establishments, quarries and mines together with such machinery, tramways appliances, buildings and personal property used in such business provided the investment therein exceeds twenty thousand dollars and providing it is not a replacement of or a successor in name to a presently existing business.
  19. To see if the Town will vote to exempt from taxation, and if so for how long, farm buildings, homes, and dwelling houses whether for sale or rent, provided they are put in construction within one year from April 1, 1957 and are appraised in the grand list exclusive of land for more than \$3,000.00 and less than \$5,000.00.
  20. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Road Commissioner or Commissioners to purchase at least 16 tons of calcium chloride for use on certain roads of the Town during the ensuing year, if so, raise money for same.
  21. To see if the Town as a Town School District will vote to authorize its School Directors on behalf of the School District to pay the entire Public High School Tuition of Moretown pupils attending Public High Schools outside of the Town of Moretown after September, 1957.
  22. To vote a tax on the grand list of the Town and the Town as a Town School District for the year 1957 for the purpose of raising money to pay the debts and

current expenses of the Town and the Town School District and to pay State and County taxes.

23. To vote upon the following questions:

“Shall licenses for the sale of malt and vinous beverages be granted in this Town?”

“Shall spirituous liquors be sold in this Town?”

24. To see if the Town will authorize its Selectmen to acquire by gift or purchase land for a municipal forest, to promote reforestation, water conservation and good forestry practices.

25. To transact any other legal business that may come before the meeting.





## HIGHWAYS

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There is a total of 69.507 miles of public highways in the town of Moretown, not including the Federal Highway which begins at Buck's bridge and extends to the Waterbury town line. This highway is under Federal control and supervision. All other highways in the town are divided into three categories:

State Highway system	11.657 miles
Selected Highways (State Aid Roads)	10.28 miles
Unselected Highways (Town Roads)	47.57 miles

The State Highway is that part of Route 100 which passes through the town of Moretown. The State has complete control and responsibility for construction and maintenance of the State Highway. Each town is assessed a share of the expense by dividing the Grand List by the total public highway mileage within the town and then multiplying by the number of miles of State Highway within the town. This year the sum amounted to \$1,965.02 for the town of Moretown.

The Selected Highways or State Aid Roads are:

- No. 1. Northfield Mountain road.
- No. 2. Route 100B. Duxbury road from Route 100 to Duxbury line.
- No. 3. Road "back of the river" from Middlesex to Berlin town line.

State Aid allotments are divided into three parts for use on Construction, Retreatment or Resurfacing.

Construction is paid out of the  $\frac{1}{2}\text{¢}$  gas tax fund and the allotment is figured \$115 per mile of Selected Highway within the town.

On Retreatment the State pays two-thirds of the cost and the town pays one-third. This work is done by the state. Selected Highway No. 2 is the only hard-surfaced Selected Highway in our town and is .75 of a mile.

Resurfacing is available for gravel roads under the State Aid system. Selected Highways No. 1 and No. 3 come under this heading, and have a mileage of 9.53. State Aid for resurfacing is available at \$50 per mile in case the town votes to raise \$25 per mile for this purpose.

State Money allotted for construction and resurfacing Unselected Highways, commonly referred to as Town Highways, is based on the total mileage of such roads maintained

within the town and is figured at \$150 per mile. To be eligible for this state money, a town must vote the equivalent of \$25 per mile to be spent on town roads. This sum and the sum voted for resurfacing of gravel roads under the State Aid system comes out of the amount raised for use by the Road Commissioner.

- SA Gravel-Resurfacing — SA No. 1 Cox Brook — Beginning 0.0 Berlin town line extending westerly .040 mi. and SA No. 1 beginning 0.0 TH No. 26 extending westerly 0.20 mi. These roads were resurfaced with 648 c. y. gravel and 55 c. y. crushed gravel.
- SA Construction — SA No. 1 Cox Brook — Beginning 1.95 westerly Berlin Town Line and extending westerly 0.38 mi. This road was raised and widened, relocated in spots, installed culverts as needed, and based and surfaced with 6132 c. y. gravel.

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## REPORT OF STATE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

During the year ending December 31, 1956, 103 visits were made in behalf of the residents of the Town of Moretown. These visits were concerned with the communicable disease and preventive health services offered by the State Health Department.

Among the services rendered were 3 infant and pre-school, and 2 school health conferences. The total number of children attending these conferences was 122. Immunization given: Smallpox vaccinations — 18; and Diphtheria-Tetanus-Whooping Cough — 64.

Salk Polio clinics conducted by the State Health Department were held and 26 individuals received 3 doses of polio vaccine; 173 received 2 doses; and 26 received one dose.

Under the communicable disease program, clinics were conducted for chest x-ray without cost for persons referred by their physician. Clinics in this area are held at the hospitals in Morrisville, Montpelier, and Barre. A total of 41 x-rays were taken for residents of Moretown during the year.

The Public Health Nurse assisted in making referrals to state and voluntary health, and social agencies.

The health programs for Moretown in 1956 were carried

out through the interest and cooperation of physicians, nurses, officials, and volunteer groups in the community.

To the Citizens of Moretown :

We have followed the pattern of last year in the presentation of the program of your schools. The State Department recognizes the School Year as that of July 1, to June 30 of the following year. This means that State Aid, as well as the Town Taxes, are not in the hands of the Town Treasurer for School use, until December and September of any given year, so that the School Department needs to borrow money for approximately seven months of each year. You will note that on January 1, 1957, the school department had an un-expended balance of \$3,997.53, which by the time of the present Town Meeting has been used.

The Flannagan School was sold to Mr. Kenneth Baird for \$1,400.00. The Selectmen and the School Board felt the Title should be thoroughly searched, and this was done by Mr. Adams of Waterbury, at a cost of \$51.99. Fifty dollars was paid from the sale, the school fund absorbed the \$1.99, and \$1,350.00 has been placed in a special Saving Account for the School Department, by the Town Treasurer, to be used only for major re-modelling or repairs.

The School Board was sorry to lose four teachers, Mrs. Cameron from the Common, retired; Mrs. Cascio and Mrs. Haskins (Special Music), who are taking advanced study; and Mrs. Hill, Taplin, who had the opportunity to teach a single grade in Waterbury. These teachers were re-placed by Mrs. Witcher, Miss Roberts, Mrs. Convy, and Mrs. Hall.

The pupils of your schools continue to "hold their own," and achieve honor grades at the High Schools they attend; an indication of good elementary preparation.

Transportation is a major item in the budget, as is also a large enrollment.

A School Tax of \$2.10 is recommended to meet the proposed budget.

From time to time your school board and superintendent become concerned with the school program as it is presently set up. You are aware that presently, we are operating five classrooms within the town. Three are located in one room buildings, and two in the Village school. The children of the Cox Brook area are transported to Northfield, and those of Jones Brook area to Berlin.

The problem of securing teachers to handle from four to eight grades in a single classroom is more difficult each year. These positions require the most capable teachers.

Teachers who possess these qualities, can, and do, secure positions which require them to teach a single grade. The recently trained teacher has little if any preparation for teaching eight grades.

The School Board and Superintendant wish to bring these questions to you for consideration:

1. Are the children of Moretown receiving a well-rounded education?

2. Is the present organization of your schools, that of four rural schools, such, that the town is likely to be able to employ and retain effective teachers?

3. What are the possibilities of bringing together a sufficient number of children in a central location, to make it possible to establish a graded school program with two grades in each room?

4. Would you like to form a study group of parents and citizens to study these questions?

Your School Board and Superintendent try to give over-all consideration to all pupils. They appreciate suggestions and are grateful for your co-operation. They meet the first Tuesday of each month, usually at the Village School, and welcome you to meet with them.
